

Reconnaissance Level Statement of Significance Examples

Not Eligible Resource

Built in 1923, this home is potentially eligible for listing on the NRHP for its direct connection to early 20th century residential growth of the community of ___ (Criteria A). Preliminary research did not reveal that the dwelling is associated with the lives of significant persons in our past (Criterion B). Due to alterations to the resource, the property does not possess the distinctive characteristics of its type, period and/or method of construction and is not known to be connected to the work of a master (Criterion C). No archaeology has been conducted at the site, therefore the property is not likely to yield information important in history or prehistory (Criterion D).

The dwelling has a low level of architectural integrity. While the location of the home and setting is intact; the design, materials, workmanship feeling and association has been altered. Changes include replacement doors and windows (some of which differ in size and location from the original), the addition of an attached garage and the enclosure of a once open porch. Such changes affect the ability of the resource to convey its historic identity. Therefore, this property is recommended not eligible for listing in the NRHP under any of the four NR criteria.

Eligible Resource

Built in 1923, this home is potentially eligible for listing on the NRHP for its direct connection to early 20th century residential growth of the community of ___ (Criteria A). Preliminary research did not reveal that the dwelling is associated with the lives of significant persons in our past (Criterion B). The property does possess the distinctive characteristics of its type, period and/or method of construction. Completed at the height of the Arts & Crafts Movement, the dwelling embodies the typical characteristics of a Craftsman Bungalow (type & period). At this time it is not known to be connected to the work of a master (Criterion C). No archaeology has been conducted at the site, therefore the property is not likely to yield information important in history or prehistory (Criterion D).

The dwelling has incurred no visible alterations and therefore retains a high level of architectural integrity with all seven aspects of integrity present. Therefore, this property is recommended eligible for listing in the NRHP under criteria A & C.
